Widzin Kwah Watershed Source of our survival, wealth and culture:

- Witsuwit'en clans gathered in the canyons to catch and prepare salmon and dry berries for winter
 - The fall was the season to hunt and trap animals for meat and fur

• The winter was spent trapping and ice fishing to supplement the diet of dried foods harvested over the summer


VIEW OF MORICETOWN AT THE TURN OF THE CENTURY

IN THE EARLY TIMES, 'KYAH WIGET WAS THE BEST PLACE IN THE AREA FOR CATCHING SALMON. IN THE SUMMER MONTHS, WHEN THE SALMON WERE RUNNING, ALL OF THE WET'SUWET'EN GATHERED AT 'KYAH WIGET. THERE ON THE WEIR BUILT ACROSS THE RIVER, THEY COULD USE THEIR GAFFS OR SET THEIR TRAPS
